Over the course of 2012, the Food Pantry of Waukesha County provided food to 16,523 clients? Each week, an average of 1,468 people turn to the Food Pantry for assistance, and 40% of them are children. Because of Salem's generosity, along with that of others in our community, there are 587 children each week in Waukesha County who are growing stronger, getting healthier, and starting each day better prepared for school. I imagine you think fireworks should be in a July Tidings, but we've got exciting news that deserves fireworks as we announce....

The United Methodist Women of Salem are hosting a luncheon followed by an exciting program as HAGAR USA/INTERNATIONAL as our guest presenter. If you haven't put this important date on your calendar – DO IT NOW....This is a Must-Not-Miss event!

Jane Tafel, Managing Director of Hagar USA will be our presenter. You may have seen the CBS documentary on the RESCUE operations that free the young girls and boys from brothels and wondered what happens to these children after the rescue? HAGAR is the best answer I know.

This program takes over when Rescue ends with medical care, psychological counseling, education, job training, micro loans and half-way homes or foster parenting until Jane or John are ready to make it on their own in the real world. Come and learn how this is happening internationally, including Afghanistan, Laos, Cambodia and Vietnam.

If possible, try to read at least one of the books in our library on the subject of sex trafficking before the meeting. I suggest the following books: *Half the Sky* by Kristoff and Sue DuWon, or *God in a Brothel*, or even the six session study book, *The Girl Under the Bridge*.

There is no charge for the luncheon but there will be a freewill offering to offset the cost of transportation for our speaker.

UMW realizes that work may interfere with participation, but perhaps you could extend your lunch hour or work the noon hour and come for the program. There will be plenty to eat!

### Why Go To Church?

A Church attendee wrote a letter to the editor of a newspaper and complained that it made no sense to go to church every Sunday. "I've gone for 30 years now," he wrote, "and in that time I have heard something like 3,000 sermons. But for the life of me, I can't remember the details of a single one of them. So, I think I'm wasting my time and the pastors are wasting theirs by giving sermons at all."

This started a real controversy in the "Letters to the Editor" column, much to the delight of the editor. It went on for weeks until someone wrote this clincher:

"I've been married for 30 years now. In that time my wife has cooked some 32,000 meals. But, for the life of me, I cannot recall the entire menu for a single one of those meals. But I do know this. They all nourished me and gave me the strength I needed to do my work. If my wife had not given me these meals, I would be physically dead today. Likewise, if I had not gone to church for nourishment, I would be spiritually dead today!"



### The Girl Under the Bridge

(A New Library Resource)

What does poverty look like to a child? What does it feel like and how can a young person make a difference? Many children have experienced poverty in their lives. This book is a curriculum that will help children ages 6-12 understand the causes and effects of poverty and how to use their voices to help end poverty. Divided

into five sessions, including an additional intergenerational session, each chapter offers scriptures, stories and activities to engage children in moving beyond charity to work for justice. Check out this new resource. It is well organized and very usable.
