

This month we'd like to draw your attention to a wonderful author.
Mitch Albom has been a musician, sports writer, playwright, and

radio/tv broadcaster. In 1995 he heard that his former sociology professor, Morrie Schwartz, was terminally ill. He started seeing him very often and a regular visit every Tuesday began. These regular visits gave Albom the idea to write a book, with the aim of paying his professor's medical bills. After many rejections, Tuesdays with Morrie was finally published and in six months was no. 1 on the New York Times bestseller's list. To this day it has sold over 14 million copies! We are pleased to tell you we have this book and several other wonderful books by Mitch Albom in our library. They are on display on the library table. Read one, and you'll want to read them all!
